

Congratulations! On behalf of the National Federation of Republican Women and the NFRW Political and Campaign team, it is my pleasure to congratulate the Nevada Federation on winning first place in the category of Top calls for states with 10-19 clubs.

This award is in recognition of your time, enthusiasm, and talent, which has shown unwavering support in getting Republican candidates elected and furthering the Republican message.

The dedication of our members nationwide was clearly demonstrated by the results:

- Clubs who completed training reported 600% more hours.
- In the first period, our members completed 593,733 calls and 2,467,405
- In the second period, our members completed 961,842 calls and 3,130,787 hours.

This totals to 1,555,575 calls and 5,598,192 hours for the trailing 12 months and equates to \$164,945,760.00 in volunteer dollars contributed to Republican campaigns across the country.


The Political and Campaign Team will offer additional Zoom training after the midterms and recommend at least one member per club to attend, as their number will impact State-level awards.

For the clubs that did not report their 1st and or 2nd-period calls or hours, they can be entered retroactively in the form in the appropriate reporting period. Clubs are prohibited from rolling their calls and hours into the 3rd period to avoid giving an unfair advantage.

Donald Trump Launches 2024 Bid for White House

PALM BEACH, Fla.—Former President Donald Trump commenced his third campaign for the White House on Nov. 15.

Trump, 76, who had hinted at a 2024 run for more than a year, announced the presidential bid in a prime-time speech at his Mar-a-Lago resort in Florida.

"In order to make America great and glorious again I am tonight announcing my candidacy for President of the United States," Trump said.

The former president stressed that this won't be his campaign but "our campaign," saying that the only force "strong enough to defeat the massive corruption we are up against is you—the American people."

"Together we will be taking on the most corrupt forces and entrenched interests imaginable. Our country is in a horrible state. We're in great trouble."

Facing a crowd of supporters and allies, the 45th president blamed the Biden administration and Democrats for high inflation, threat of war, and the open southern border.


Lots to Celebrate in the 2022 Midterms!

Republican women worked hard this election, and we set a high bar for a Red Wave. It's better to have lofty goals and be optimistic than to be a pessimist.

Even though the Red Wave didn't make it ashore, by all accounts, Republicans won the 2022 Mid-



Counting continues in some races, and as of this writing, Republicans will have at least 222 seats when Congress returns in January. This puts us in the majority and checks the Biden agenda!

We retired Nancy Pelosi as Speaker of the U.S. House and now have Republican Kevin McCarthy at the helm. Republicans elected seven new Republican women members: Anna Paulina Luna (FL13), Laurel Lee (FL15), Erin Houchin (IN09), Lori Chavez-DeRemer (OR05), Monica De La Cruz (TX15), Jen Kiggans (VA02) and Harriet Hageman (WY.).

In the U.S. Senate, we elected 40-year-old Alabama Federation member Katie Britt. She is the first woman to be elected to the U.S. Senate in Alabama and won by a tsunami.

Incumbent Republican Governors Kay Ivey (AL), Kim Reynolds (IA), and Kristi Noem (SD) won easily and will be joined by Sarah Huckabee Sanders, Arkansas' first female governor.

Republicans also won in eight of the races targeted by NFRW. The Campaign Committee provided training to get out the vote and introduced you to the candidates via Zoom. Candidates who won were Ted Budd (N.C. Sen), J.D. Vance (O.H. Sen), Ron DeSantis (F.L. Gov), Tom Kean (NJ07), Jen Kiggans (VA02), Monica De La Cruz (TX15), Juan Ciscomani (AZ06) and Zach Nunn (IA03).




Western Conference Recap: Stars & Stripes

Nevada was honored to host the 2022 NFRW "Stars and Stripes" Western Regional Conference in Las Vegas. Nevada President Caroline Smith as host President welcomed the attendees representing some 17 states. Regions 1 and 2 of the

NFRW, which comprise ten western states, collectively organized 2the event. Among the honored guests were NFRW President Eileen Sobjack; Region 1 Director and NFRW Member at Large Heidi Parker Martin; Region 2 Director and NFRW Second Vice-President Michelle Buckwalter-Shurman; Region 9 Director and NFRW 3 rd Vice-President Carol Hadley; and Region 6 Director and NFRW Member at Large Julie Harris.

The conference proved to be very informative and provided us with the opportunity to get to know some of our National officers and other state federation officers better. The speakers covered a wide range of issues:

- Chris Yadon, Managing Director of Saprea, a 501c(3) focused on combatting Childhood Sexual Abuse and Human Trafficking.
- Sgt. Courtney Sinagra, National Guard, presented "A Young Women's Perspective on Honor, Service, and Freedom.
- Sharlene Wells, Former Director of Communications, at Dept. of Defense, presented "Answering the Call Celebrating our Past Veterans." Her organization has sponsored programs and memorial books honoring the 60 th anniversary of the Korean War, the 50 th anniversary of the Vietnam War, and the 25 th anniversary of Desert Storm.
- Holocaust Survivor Panel Discussion "Liberation; What It Means to be an American." Five individuals who were children during the Holocaust recounted their personal experiences and stories of courage.
- Marlo Oaks, Utah state Treasurer presented "Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) Credit Indicators." He gave examples of how certain

In addition, Congressman Mark Amodei (NV) and Congressman Burgess Owens (UT) spoke to us on "The Red Wave: Principled Leadership and Personal Freedom."

President Eileen Sobjack gave her address. Here are the key points:

- Prior to the elections, she was interviewed on Fox and Friends to discuss Women Voters and the Elections. The interview can be viewed on YouTube.
- She has written op-eds for The Hill and the Washington Times.
- The NFRW now has 65,000 members nationwide. This is 97 percent of their total previous membership.
- NFRW now has a Faith Coalition. Prayer is important during these times.
- The NFRW is now debt-free. The Federation headquarters office and condo are both paid off.
- The 2023 NFRW Biennial will be held in Oklahoma City on September 30 October 1. Details will follow. Additionally, there were vendors, beautiful silent auction items, and two delicious lunches. Thanks to all the NFRW officers, NvFRW President Caroline Smith, the Western Conference Committee, and the various state clubs who donated their time and money to make this a successful conference.

Pamous Women of Nevada Bertha (Paton) Raffetto



Bertha-Raffetto composed the song "Home Means Nevada," which was made the official state song by an act of the legislature on February 6, 1933. She was also an accomplished poet, her talents showing as early as three years old. Even further, she

excelled as a talented musician. As a writer, she was the Nevada Federation of Women's Cubs poet laureate. She also was awarded the Poet's Parchment by the General Federation of Women's Clubs for outstanding work in poetry. In the 1930s, she wrote the "Poet's Corner" in the Nevada State Journal.

Her fluent speaking abilities led her to become a leading influence in the club and civic work. In fact, she actively participated in Republican politics in various campaigns. She was a two-decade member of the Reno Branch of Pen women and served as its treasurer, vice president, and president. She was also a member of the Reno Civic Club and Nevada and General Federation of Women's Clubs. She died in Reno in 1952.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Items to Have on Hand for a Board Or Membersip Meeting

- Copy of organization's Bylaws and other rules of the organization such as Special Rules of Order, Standing Rules, and State and National organization's bylaws;
- Copy of organization's adopted parliamentary authority (such as Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 2020 edition);
- Copy of a quick basic reference parliamentary procedure sheet/card;
- Listing of organization's Officers, Directors (or other Board members), standing committees, and special committees with their members; may also have a listing of national, provincial, and state officers, directors, etc.
- Agenda with Order of Business listing all known matters to come up, shown in proper sequence under correct headings—or with their scheduled times—as applicable;
- Gavel;
- Minutes record book;
- Calendar;
- Watch or time-keeping device with second hand or buzzer—usually not used in Board meetings, but may be used for Membership meetings;
- Listing of membership (especially at a meeting with elections).

NOTE: The Presiding Officer and/or Secretary must see that these items are brought to a meeting.

Jill Douglass is the President of one of the newest NvFRW club's in Sourthern Nevada.

It is an honor to introduce myself to my fellow Republican women's club members. In thinking about what to share, I decided on information that best captures the essence of who I am and my priorities, as ordered below. I will share

how I got involved and why I serve as president to the *Sparks Republican Women in Northern Nevada.*

First and foremost, the lens through which I see the world and what governs my heart and actions is my faith in the Lord Jesus, Son of God *Most High*.

I am a mother of two sons, ages 13 and 17, who make every day the best day of my life. I have shared this wonderful parenting experience with my husband, Tom, with whom I have been married for 21 years. I also work as a full-time consultant in the public safety sector.

Life is a journey with many chapters, and mine is no exception. Being born and raised in Alaska, I learned great skills from my father, mother and others on how to be self-sufficient through hunting and fishing. Along with overall survivalist skills, I learned sewing of fur and leather garments, beadwork, and outdoor activities such as horse ownership, snowmobiling, snowshoeing, and more. Not the typical life, but a great one.

Unexpected events changed the course of my life in my late 20s that diverted my path to a grand pursuit of education and work overseas. I graduated from Seattle Pacific University, Rutgers University, and the University of St. Petersburg in the Russian Federation. Part of this story includes serving in the United States Peace Corps as an international economic advisor to the County of Estonia. This is where I met my husband Tom; a mechanical-aeronautical engineer turned Christian missionary living in Estonia.

The two Americans hooked up and married. We also lived in New Mexico and then in South Dakota to assist the Lakota Sioux people, me through higher education, and Tom and I together through Christian ministry spanning two reservations. Overall I worked overseas for around 15 years and Tom for 25 years.

Upon returning to America to help my mother care for my ailing father, I was appalled by the nation I returned to; it was not the same. I knew something was going wrong in observing from a distance what Obama was doing. His actions were contrary to all that seemed right.

There was also a new depth of corruption, an attack against traditional family values, indoctrination of today's youth, increased drug and alcohol abuse, and spiraling social decline. This is the strategy for leading a country and society to Communism. This is what I studied at Rutgers and what I learned while in Russia. 

Stars Linked to Our Holidays



In her latest interview with Gayle King, Julia Roberts revealed an interesting detail about her past: Martin Luther King Jr. paid the bill for the Hollywood star's birth.

The Pretty Woman star turned 55 this October and marked the occasion by chatting with King about her accomplishments, life, and childhood. During the talk, King asked Roberts about her little-known connection to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"Let's start with the day you were born. Who paid the hospital bill?" King asked.

"Okay, her research is very good," Roberts said with a smile. Julia confirmed that Dr. King and his wife, Coretta, paid for her mother's hospital bill when she gave birth to Julia.

"My parents had a theater school in Atlanta called the *Actors* and *Writers Workshop*, and one day, Coretta Scott King called my mother and asked if her kids could be part of the school 'cause they were having a hard time finding a place that would accept her kids. And my mom is like, 'Sure, come on over', Roberts explained."


In the 1960s, Gayle King noted, it was not common for black and white children to attend the same schools—especially acting schools. Paying for Betty Lou Bredemus and Walter Grady Roberts's hospital bill was a way in which the Kings thanked them for their kindness."

Pearl Harbor Day

The battleship USS Arizona sank after being bombed when Pearl Harbor was attacked on Dec. 7, 1941. More than one thousand of the ship's sailors lost their lives, with at least 900 remaining with the submerged vessel.

In the 1950s, plans took shape to create an Arizona memorial. However, by 1960, less than half of the \$500,000 needed had been raised. That would change after Elvis Presley volunteered to perform at a benefit concert for the memorial on March 25, 1961. At the time of the show, Elvis was 26, the average age of the sailors lost at Pearl Harbor.

Elvis was a patriot who genuinely believed in the cause. He performed the benefit concert for a 4,000-seat crowd that raised more than \$54,000 for the memorial, with Elvis also making a separate donation. Even more important than the amount that was immediately raised, Elvis' actions drew fresh attention to the USS Arizona Memorial Fund. After the benefit, more money arrived from both the public sector and private sources, and the memorial was soon under construction. It was dedicated on May 30, 1962.



History of Armistice/Vetrans Day

We commemorate Armistice Day on November 11 to remember the Treaty signed to end World War I—the war to end all wars. It was to take effect at eleven in the morning, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918. There was still shelling from both sides throughout the day, and the armistice had to be extended several times over many months. It became a formal peace agreement when the Treaty

of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace de Versailles.

Most of the Allied Nations have changed the name to *Veterans Day.* The first Armistice Day Celebration was held by King George V at Buckingham Palace. Many nations celebrate in different ways. These include a show of flags, a toast, two minutes of silence, wearing armbands, banquets, formal celebrations at cemeteries, and parades with bands playing patriotic songs.

In the United States, Veterans Day honors all American veterans living and those who have passed away. The official national remembrance of those killed in action is Memorial Day or Decoration Day prior to WWI. It was first celebrated on May 30, 1868. Howev-



er, Armistice Day is to show how we achieved peace with the Treaty as it was originally intended to do.

There is a folksong titled "The Strangest Dream," written about 1949-1950 by Ed McCurdy during the Korean Conflict/ War. It remains the most influential antiwar song ever written. It has been translated into 80 languages and is the theme for the Peace Corps. The first two lines of the song are:

Last night, I had the strangest dream I ever had before. There was no more killing. There was no more war. if only...
