Get-Out-The-Vote radio campaign takes off

Funding is raised in just 48 hours

At the NvFRW 2018 Fall Board and Membership Meeting held Friday and Saturday, October 12 and 13, a motion was made and seconded for the NvFRW to fund a radio-based Get Out The Vote (GOTV) campaign for the state of Nevada. The motion passed unanimously.

The campaign was for at least 100 sixty-second radio ads broadcast simultaneously on six radio stations and one TV station on the "Live & Local - Now! with Kevin Wall" (from 9 to noon) and "WAR Now: The Wayne Allyn Root Show!" (from 3 to 6 p.m.). The ads ran on "Best of Live & Local – Now" and "Best of WAR Now" on the weekends at no additional charge. Plus, Kevin Wall conducted a 15-minute interview with NvFRW that was broadcasted each Friday morning at 10 a.m. starting Oct. 19 and ending November 2.

The ads emphasized the importance of voting, and voting the straight Republican ticket for all offices in Nevada. Individual candidates were not mentioned; this was strictly a GOTV campaign for all GOP candidates running in Nevada. The NvFRW voted to support a NO VOTE on Question 5, which would allow the DMV to automatically register people to vote unless they choose to Opt Out in writing. The ads also stated that

they were funded by the NvFRW and encouraged women to go to our website, NvFRW.org, to find a Republican woman's club in their area. Besides promoting and encouraging people to Get Out and Vote, the ads also promoted the NvFRW and all our clubs.

The campaign cost a significant amount of money and most of the money was raised from attendees donating personally. The clubs were asked to each contribute at least \$300 to this GOTV effort or whatever was comfortable. A few local clubs were able to get their board approval early while other clubs went back to their boards and the funds poured

in. Within a few days we had all the money needed plus we ended up collecting over 30% more. That extra money was used to air additional ads.

It was an exciting process to see everyone come together with such enthusiasm. As a final note, I was at a Dean Heller rally with Sen. Lindsey Graham and Sen. Cory Gardner when a stranger looked at my Southern Hills RW name badge and asked me if I was part of the organization that was sponsoring the Get Out the Vote Ads. He was so excited to hear the ads encouraging Republicans to vote. He couldn't say enough about our efforts.


2019 Nominations are right around the corner!



Happy Thanksgiving 2018

Washoe Republican Women

Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States, and Thanksgiving 2018 occurs on Thursday, November 22.

In 1621, the Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Indians shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies. For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving were celebrated by individual colonies and states. It wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest was successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit.



Now remembered as American's "first Thanksgiving"—although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time the festival lasted for three days. While no record exists of the historic banquet's exact menu, the Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow wrote in his journal that Governor Bradford sent four men on a "fowling" mission in preparation for the event, and that the Wampanoag guests arrived bearing five deer.

Historians have suggested that many of the dishes were likely prepared using traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. Because the Pilgrims had no oven and the Mayflower's sugar supply had dwindled by the fall of 1621, the meal did not feature pies, cakes or other desserts, which have become a hallmark of contemporary celebrations.

Thanksgiving becomes an official holiday

Pilgrims held their second Thanksgiving celebration in 1623 to mark the end of a long drought that had threatened the year's harvest and prompted Governor Bradford to call for a religious fast. Days of fasting and thanksgiving on an annual or occasional basis became common practice in other New England settlements as well.

During the American Revolution, the Continental Congress designated one or more days of thanksgiving a year, and in 1789, George Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation by the national government of the United States; in it, he called upon Americans to express their gratitude for the happy conclusion to the country's war of independence and the successful ratification of the U.S. Constitution. His successors John Adams and James Madison also designated days of thanks during their presidencies.

In 1817, New York became the first of several states to officially adopt an annual Thanksgiving holiday; each celebrated it on a different day, however, and the American South remained largely unfamiliar with the tradition.

In 1827, the noted magazine editor and prolific writer Sarah Josepha Hale — author, among countless other things, of the nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb" — launched a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday.

For 36 years, she published numerous editorials and sent scores of letters to governors, senators, presidents and other politicians.

Abraham Lincoln finally heeded her request in 1863, at the height of the Civil War, in a proclamation entreating all Americans to ask God to "commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife" and to "heal the wounds of the nation."

He scheduled Thanksgiving for the final Thursday in November, and it was celebrated on that day every year until 1939, when Franklin D. Roosevelt moved the holiday up a week in an attempt to spur retail sales during the Great Depression. Roosevelt's plan, known derisively as Franksgiving, was met with passionate opposition, and in 1941 the president reluctantly signed a bill making Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November.
