What IF someone caused skyrocketing inflation, depreciation of your standard of living, a demand that you work harder to pay



We then started the meeting with customary order, including thanks to the various persons

> contributing to the success of the meeting, which included our outstanding graphic artist Anita Kornoff. NvFRW secretary Kathy Doyle presented the preliminary and final credential report and confirmed a auorum.

Following the approval by the Board of the nominees for the various standing committee chairs and vice-

chairs, reports were given by the Executive Committee, club presidents, and Regents. Lynne Hartung presented the NvFRW 2020-2021 financial review. After that, Budget and Finance Chair Claudia Fisher presented the amended budget, which was approved after receiving comments from NvFRW Treasurer Barbara Kirk.

I summarized my recent attendance at the April 2022 NFRW Spring Board Meeting in Old Town Alexander, Va. The primary message coming from the National Board was to unite in electing our Republican candidates at the midterms. Noteworthy was that our national membership for 2021 had risen to approximately 65,000 members, and in 2022 there will be 275

Holden and Beau spoke of the SideKick program, campaign volunteer awards, and how to schedule volunteer work shifts.

Multiple club presentations were given by WRW member Melissa Clement, Douglas County member Linda Colvechio, ARWRW member Lydia Ruiz, RWR member Bev Stenehjem, and SHRW member Heather Stamer, and BBRW member Jill Douglas.

We were then fortunate to have as our noon speaker Niger Innis, who was introduced by **NvFRW First VP** Melissa Blundo. Niger Innis, board member of the Congress of **Racial Equality** and a member of

annah came to the West at age 35, passing through the Truckee Meadows on her way to Sacramento. Within a year, she returned to Nevada, where she remained for the next 41 years.

In 1860, she organized a private co-education school in Carson City, which had no schools at the time. She was amply supported by the Territorial Legislature, Governor James W. Nye, and soon-to-be Senator William M. Stewart. Within four years, her school had become successful and had the honor of being visited by Mark Twain, who mimicked some of his observations in scenes in Tom Sawyer. She became the first instructor and librarian at the University of Nevada after her school's move to Reno.

A historical marker at the state capital says she and Eliza Babcock famously won a bid to construct an iron fence around the Capitol grounds in 1875. Further information is available from the Nevada Historical Society and "Nevada Women's History Project."

BOOTS ON THE GROUND

Ideas to engage your members and community



an you believe that there isn't a procedure manual for candidates on how to conduct a campaign? Every election cycle, we spin our wheels, running around trying to figure out what to do and how to do it.

Last year, we discovered this when we started to recruit candidates for the four school board seats. We looked around but couldn't find any information on how to start or what to do.

The Republican Women of Reno (RWR) have decided that enough is enough. We decided to create an infrastructure for all our Republican candidates to guide them in their pursuit of the seat they are running for.

We are calling it *Boots on the Ground*, RWR's newest brigade. *Boots on the Ground* will be a guide that provides step-by-step instructions to candidates about everything they need to win: from obtaining an EIN # for filing to designing yard signs, getting demographic data on constituents, and finding donors.

Boots on the Ground will also help mobilize teams of volunteers to go door-to-door and hand out literature for the candidates.

This is a brand new concept that we are betatesting with our school board candidates. We hope to produce a procedure manual in time for our next election cycle in 2024 – which will be here sooner than we think.

Nicôl Herris, president of RWR, will be sharing our *Boots on the Ground* and inviting every club in Nevada to join us!

DEBATE: ITS RULES AND DECORUM

DEFINITION OF DEBATE

Debate is the discussion of the merits of a pending question; whether the proposal (motion, resolution) under consideration should or should not be agreed to by the group/assembly. Here are some rules and decorum:



DECORUM IN DEBATE

A Member should: Confine remarks to the merits of the pending question. Refrain from attacking a member's motives and avoid name-calling. The motion, not the member, is the subject of debate. Address all remarks through the Presiding Officer/Chair and not each other

SOME RULES GOVERNING DEBATE

Every group member has the right to speak to every debatable motion before it is acted upon. The motion has to be on the floor in order to debate it.

A member must be recognized by the Presiding Officer/Chair before speaking in debate. The person making the motion has the right to speak first in debate.

A member may speak twice (if group rules allow) for a pre-determined time on each pend-ing motion.

The Presiding Officer/Chair should see that those debating for and those arguing against a pending question should alternate in debate. Debate rights are not transferable. directly.

Refrain from speaking against one's own motion. Refrain from side conversations, whispering, or in any way interrupting the debate and voting on a motion/resolution.

Not interrupt another member speaking in debate, nor should the Presiding Officer/Chair do so, except in a special situation where the urgency of the situation justifies the interruption.

It should be noted that, in a deliberative assembly/group, motions should be brought to the floor before the start of debate, or any conversation about a proposed motion. However, in small groups, a brief informal discussion or consultation of a subject may assist a member in framing a proper motion.

Regents Program

There is a lot to learn about the Nevada Federation of Republican Women (NvFRW). The club you belong to and her sister clubs in Nevada make up the NvFRW. The NvFRW and her sister clubs on the state level make up the National Federation of Republican Women (NFRW). The Regent Program of the Nevada Federation of Republican Women was modeled after the Regent Program of the National Federation of Republican Women. Through a free-will donation, both are groups of members who help educate their members in leadership and campaign management to identify and support Republican candidates and Republican values.

The Nevada Federation of Republican Women's Regent Program is growing. The February/March newsletter reported 60 Regents enrolled. I am happy to report today that the number has grown to 78. It is reassuring that our members realize the importance of good leadership and recognize that leadership is developed through training, example, and experience. I hope to provide insight into the workings and rationale for the Regent's program to enlighten our members about this important program and encourage them to join us.

When I took on the responsibility of the Southern Regents Director, I was forwarded a brief history of the Regents Program compiled by Nancy Dallas. I gleaned from this brief history that the Regents program was started in 1989 to raise funds to educate NvFRW members. Over the years, it narrowed its scope to funding the Leadership Conferences and Campaign Management School. We trained 190 members at our Leadership conferences this past January. In-person Campaign Management School should return soon.

Leadership Conferences are an essential tool in preparing your club leaders to ensure your clubs are run professionally, efficiently, and effectively within the parameters of the National Federation of Republican Women and our own



Nevada Federation of Republican Women. Regents are also responsible for the cost of the Regents



meeting (35 in attendance April 2022) and the reception that follows (42 in attendance April 2022). Regents meet before the Board of Directors meets twice a year. This meeting is run under the NvFRW's By-Laws, Robert Rules of Order, and within the scope of the Regent's Standing Rules. The Regent's Reception is often referred to as a "cocktail party." In reality, this reception is a social event where members freely discuss the politics of the day or their preferred candidates. It is a great way to break the ice when meeting new members because you know you already have something in common. Beverages and finger food are provided. Regent's other expenses are clearly stated in their Standing Rules and include reimbursements for the cost of attending club meetings promoting the Regents program. The Standing Rules provide the guidelines and requirements for approving any other spending.

Many newer members have not heard of the Regent Program, and older members have forgotten about it. Your 2022-2023 Regent Directors in the North and South plan on changing that because while leadership is imperative on the club level, it is critical on a personal level. Each of us must become the captain of our army of one (ourselves) and take our fight to preserve our freedoms and conservative values to the grocery check-out line, our hair and nail salons, and our relatives, neighbors, and friends. Still not a Regent? We would love to have you join us—we need you. Please consider committing, then fill out the form in this newsletter with your donation and mail it to your regional director. 

SECRETARY'S CORNER

Greetings Club Secretaries

In this newsletter, I'm continuing with excerpts from the mini-workshop entitled "Great Meetings Start with a Great Secretary," given by Joannah Schumacher, Registered Parliamentarian and member of the National Association of Parliamentarians First Nevada Unit.

This is part two of BASICS OF MINUTES. As all of you are so competent and already know the basics, the following can serve as a checklist/reminder.

After the Meeting:

Writing the minutes

Notify committee members of their appointments and objectives.

Create an ACTION LIST, showing actions to be taken, when, and by whom.

Retain any important documents given to you at the meeting.

Document the facts—not personal opinions.

Only capture "Actions Completed"—not verbal discussions.

What Should Minutes Include:

Name of society or organization.

What kind of meeting? Regular, special, annual.

Date and Time of meeting—include the meeting place if it is not always the same.

State that the Chairman/President and Secretary were present or names of the persons who substituted for them.

Document the Time the meeting was called to order and adjourned.

State whether the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read or as corrected.

State that the minutes were approved "as corrected"—you do not need to specify what the correction was.

What the Minutes Should NOT Include:

The Name of the seconder of the motion.

Withdrawn motions not seconded. "Everything said at the meeting."

NFRW Policy for Counting Volunteer Hours-Keep track of them!

The following policy details activities that can be included in your volunteer campaign hours:

1. All non-paid campaign activities benefiting our Republican Party, candidates, or Federation.

2. Campaign work done in or out of the home, including mailings, phone calls, computer work, and social media postings or blogging.

3. Work at or for a special campaign event—but NOT if you attend as a paid guest OR if you are compensated for the event.

4. Attendance at State or Nat'l. Federation Board of Directors Meetings and Conventions, including time spent in preparation for meetings if you serve on a committee. Time in session at municipality, precinct/ward, county, district, or state party conventions (including travel.)

5. Time spent as a county, state, or national party committee member or as a temporary member, i.e., Rules Committee, Resolutions Committee, etc.

6. Campaign work at club meetings, i.e., getting petitions signed, doing mailings. NOT COUNTING TIME SPENT IN BUSINESS or CLUB MEETINGS..

7. Volunteering at any municipality, county, state or Federation headquarters.

8. Volunteering for a Republican candidate for a non-partisan office, school board elections, etc.

9. Working as a poll watcher on Election Day, but NOT if you are paid.

10. Involvement in a Campaign Management School, i.e., training to be a faculty member, teaching and organizing a campaign school.

11. Working on Election Day as an Election Judge or Election Clerk (only if you turn the money you are paid over to your county party or your local FRW club.)

12. Presenting campaign (unpaid) programs or speeches at local civic organizations.

13. Appearing on local media for the GOP cause.

14. Running for office—time spent campaigning.

15. Time spent registering voters.

16. Hours spent as editor of a club newsletter or state newsletter and hours spent as club yearbook chairman.

17. The time female Associate members spend volunteering for the Federation or individual clubs, or GOP, i.e., working at the HQ of the Party or a candidate, putting up signs, etc. can only be counted by ONE individual club, the primary club of the member.




What spurs children born into abject poverty, one a slave and one on a hardscrabble backwoods farm, to want to learn so much that they will dog-ear any book they can find with constant reading? Or to be glad for a menial job that will allow them to pin up a newspaper on the wall and read it as they work? Brian Kilmeade tells the story of two such children who somehow became The President and the Freedom Fighter in his brilliantly told story of two fascinating and essential leaders providence brought to us just when needed. He masterfully weaves together the stories of two men as they grew up and gained recognition as leaders. They finally came together to solve our young nation's greatest challenge as one "conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal" but wedded to slavery.

Frederick Douglass broke free of his bondage and, helped by white abolitionist mentors, lectured and published, telling about the evils of slavery, of the very idea that one man might keep another enslaved in ignorance and degradation.

Abraham Lincoln became a lawyer and a politician, seeking to free America from the scourge of slavery without tearing it asunder.

The story of these two men, how they ended slavery "with malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right...to finish the work...to bind up the nation's wounds," is one every American should read. A book club such as this should be a part of every Republican Women's club.
