What a busy and exciting time of year. There's so much going on. All the NvFRW club award forms received have been submitted to NFRW for consideration. Also, I've sent in our state award form for the prestigious Betty Heitman Award.

Here's the super NEWS. I am bubbling with pride to announce that the Achievement Award forms submitted by 18 of our Nevada clubs make us eligible to receive 16 Diamond Awards, which is the highest-level award, and two other clubs eligible for the Bronze award.

We could very possibly have ALL 20 clubs receiving an award at the NFRW Convention in Oklahoma. Keep those fingers crossed. You gotta love it—our small state showing we're the best. I've been told that based on the information I've submitted on behalf of our state federation, we qualify for the Betty Heitman Award, which is especially exciting for me, being from Louisiana, the same state as Betty Heitman herself. The award is for State Excellence and is presented to states demonstrating excellence, achievement, or accomplishment in community relations, programs, campaign activities, and state functions. Betty was a Republican activist from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, from 1978 to 1980, and served as president of the National Federation of Republican Women. As president, she worked to establish two schools for training within the organization, one for campaign management and the other for political polling. There's much more to learn about Betty, and I encourage you to look up her biography. Every two years, we honor her at our national biennial

convention by giving awards in her name to states that show the outstanding qualities exemplified by the award itself.

I'm also presently working in preparation for our upcoming biennial state and national conventions, which I hope you'll attend. NvFRW Nominating Facts To Know

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

As we prepare for the NvFRW upcoming Biennial Convention in October, it is important to review the bylaws and know the proper qualifications for nominations for the elected officer positions of President, 1 st Vice President, 2 nd Vice President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Nominating Committee Chair, Northern District Director and Southern District Director. These positions will be voted upon at the Convention. What do the NvFRW Bylaws say about eligibility?

SECTION 1. QUALIFICATIONS

- A. Each elected or appointed officer shall be an active member in good standing of a club.
 A member in good standing shall be one whose current dues have been paid in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws and those of their club and who is not under disciplinary action.
- B. To be eligible for the office of NvFRW President a person shall have served at least two (2) years as President of a Nevada Federated Club or two (2) terms (4 years) on the Board of Directors of the NvFRW.
- C. To be eligible for the office of Treasurer a person must have a minimal working knowledge of ac- counting and accounting software or a willingness and ability to learn how to use QuickBooks or similar software.
- D. All other elected officers shall have served at least one (1) year as an elected officer of a club.

In B. above in my opinion, to be considered for the office of President the nominee must have served two (2) years as a club president or two (2) terms (4 years) on the Board at the time of their nomination.

ARTICLE IV – OFFICERS Section 2. Elected Officers

- B. Election. The officers shall be elected at the NvFRW Biennial Convention for a term of two (2) years or until their successors take office.
- 1. No officer shall serve in the same position for more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 2. An officer serving fifteen (15) months or more of a term shall be considered to have served a term.
- 3. An officer candidate may not simultaneously run for more than one NvFRW office.

In #2 above the issue of 15 months refers to the two consecutive term limit wording in #1.

President Biden is campaigning to "finish the job," and that is a dangerous prospect for America.

Spotlighting a New Club President Mimi Odicho



My name is "Mimi"

No, Mimi is not a nickname. In Assyrian, it represents the number "100" and also means "Mother."

A little girl grows up on the farm learning how to read clouds, the rain, and even the leaves to find out what kind of trees and fruit will come. She also learned how to protect her country as a child as she would protect her farm. Mimi graduated from college and was a teacher in Syria. Later she fulfilled her dream of coming to the United States of America.

From the very beginning, she looked for a way to be useful to this country. Her understanding of politics was limited. However, as she began studying, she found her heart, soul, and mind were leaning towards the Republican Party. Her attitude has always been to gather information, listen carefully, and come up with solutions.

When her sister with her three children were held hostage by Isis, Mimi decided to dedicate her life to working for females affected by these terrorist groups. She describes herself as

an Assyrian Activist Female. She has coordinated related events and assemblies in Assyria: Babylon, UR, Syria, and the museums in both Germany and France.

While living in Chicago, Mimi had the opportunity to work with Marc Kirk, a former Illinois-based Republican Senator. Years later, Mimi moved to Arizona, where she joined a Republican Women's group. Meanwhile, publishing five books of poetry, all about the love of country and defending family and home. "Family and love are connected to this country we call home," she says.

Last October, when Mimi moved to Las Vegas, she immediately started looking for another Republican group to join in serving the community and promoting Republican values. She describes herself as determined to the point of being stubborn and strives to always leave a situation better than she found it.

One day NvFRW President Caroline Smith called Mimi to talk about how a Las Vegas club was struggling and needed some leadership support. Mimi immediately stepped up to fill the vacancy feeling it was her duty to dedicate all her energy and knowledge to helping this club. While our country is currently at war with such diverse views of the future, she feels we must continue to work together to preserve the conservative values and way of life we are here to protect. She compares the urgency of the situation to taking care of the knife wound in the back before you worry about a rose thorn in your finger.

Mimi created a program called "Read 4urHero," a great example to

new generations of how important it is to appreciate the true patriot and encourage children to read more rather than spend time on the Internet.

Mimi Sums Things Up:

As a woman, it's a gift to be a mother—it's a privilege to be a patriot and is a conscious choice. I know every choice has consequences, but our dedication has a positive result. I will do my best to leave a mark and make a difference because, honestly, it makes me both proud and sad to step up and feel the pain of the country. As an Assyrian immigrant, I wonder if Americans ever understand what it is to lose a Country so they can know what it is to defend your shelter.

Election Information Nevada



Elections in Nevada are held every two years in even-numbered years for Election Information - **New** to Nevada 6.13.2023 4Elections in Nevada Elections in Nevada are held every two years in even numbered years for national, state, and local offices. Primary elections are scheduled in the spring to select candidates for the general election in the fall.

Primary Elections

Federal/State Primary Elections are "CLOSED." That means if **you** chose Republican or Democrat as your party in your Voter Registration, you may vote only for candidates from your party for partisan offices such as President, Governor, Congress, and State Legislatures. You may also vote for non-partisan offices such as the mayor, **judges**, city council, and school boards. If your party affiliation is other than Republican or Democrat, you may only vote in non-partisan contests. Nevada will have its first Presidential Preference Primary election in 2024, where each party will select its presidential candidate for the general election.

General Election

The winners of the primaries run in the general election. During this election, all voters may vote independent of political affiliation. Minor party candidates for federal and state offices are included on the ballot.

Voting Process

Voting is available on Election Day, and early voting periods are available for all elections. Contact your local County Clerk or Registrar of Voters to find your local polling place.

Mail-In Ballots

Mail-in ballots are sent to every registered voter. They must be postmarked or deposited in drop-off boxes by Election Day. Signature verification is conducted as they are received. Counties begin counting mail ballots in public fifteen days before Election Day, and must be completed on the seventh day following the election. Contact your county for drop-off box locations. The Regents are the NvFRW Committee that is self-funded to meet the objective of training our club's past, present and future leaders and providing a reception before the State Convention and Board of Directors meetings. This reception is known as the Regents Reception. The Leadership Conferences are held at no cost to our members. The Regents Reception is at no cost to the Regents and open to all other members at a minimal cost. The Regents' Reception is a meet and greet allowing members from the northern and southern clubs to socialize. Attending the reception is a must for many candidates.

The Regents program is critical to the success of our Leadership Conferences. These conferences are vital to our clubs as they teach our clubs' elected Executive Committee and Board of Directors about their relationship to the Nevada Federation of Republican Women (NvFRW) and the National Federation of Republican Women (NFRW).

The conference ex-

plains the function of each Executive Committee member's role and expectations for your Board of Directors. Attendance at the Leadership Conferences also allows clubs to interact and share their "best practices" with one another.

The conference is open to all NvFRW members. Conferees, in turn, share this information with their clubs, building a strong, effective membership. Leadership Conferences are held twice each year. One in the North and as required by our State Bylaws. The Regent's meeting and receptions are held twice each year. Our meetings are held in accordance with our State Bylaws and


Regent's Standing Rules, all under the framework of Robert's Rules of Order.

I'm sure this article will inspire hope for tomorrow in this era when our world seems to be completely off balance. Katie believes strongly in protecting our rights and freedoms for the next generations. Her interest in civics began in middle school when she attended a leadership camp called TeenPact. Currently, she is working on starting a club of conservative and Republican youth in the Reno-Sparks area. In the future, she hopes to graduate college with a degree in political science and begin a career in policymaking. —Editor



It is common knowledge that youth are the future. The upcoming generation will soon become the leaders of industries, culture, and government in our world. Unfortunately, that future seems to be in danger for the Republican Party.

According to the PEW Research Center, 56% of Republicans are over age 50 vs. 39% in 1996, and unless something is done about it, it will only get worse. This decline in Republican youth creates a worrying problem for the future if steps aren't taken to engage the next generation. But before the Republican Party can engage the next generation, it must understand it.

The teenage years are said to be the most influential and important years when it comes to determining a person's beliefs and values. Nowadays, most of this is done through social media. It's estimated that this new generation spends more time on social media than any other generation. Unfortunately, the majority of social media is controlled by Democrats or left-leaning populations.

For Republican and right-leaning teenagers, this can be incredibly lonely and isolating. At almost every turn, they are met with videos, posts, and content that oppose and condemn their viewpoints. It can leave teenagers feeling as if no one else shares their perspective. In a world where cancel culture runs rampant, teenagers often feel pressured by their peers to remain silent about their views or to change their views if they don't fit the social opinion.

Looking towards young adult life, it only gets worse. Many young people move away from their

families, who most likely share similar political views, for school or work opportunities. This leaves them feeling even more isolated and alone.

Now, these young adults are not simply facing pressure from their friends but also from superiors, such as college professors and employers, to change their political stance.

Often, their ability to voice their opinions is limited, especially if they choose to attend college. Despite claiming to be bastions of the exchange of ideas, many colleges limit what students or faculty can say or do.

For example, Ohio's Sinclair Community College enforced what can only be described as a blatant disregard of the First Amendment when they issued a ban on the use of handheld signs during protests or demonstrations. This caused problems when the Traditional Values Club hosted a Stand Up for Religious Freedom rally on the college campus, which ended with the police being called upon and the participants being forced to hide their signs.

But there is hope!

Students want something other than the agenda that is forced upon them. The students harmed by Ohio's Sinclair Community College's ban had decided to reach out and file a lawsuit against the college. With the help of the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression, they won! Eventually, the college was forced to change its policies and remove the ban on signage.

There are many more stories like this one of students fighting for their rights. Young people want to make a change in their world for the better, and they are willing to take action.

But the problem is that they are isolated.

The Republican party needs to reach out to this future generation, not only to ensure its future but to help make an impact in the present. One way that the Republican party can help the younger generations is through providing a sense of community. If the Republican party were to provide a sense of community for youth where they could express their views without fear, then they would feel less isolated and more likely to volunteer or participate in helping steer their community in the right direction. One of the best ways that this can be accomplished is through the use of social media. By connecting with youth through social media, they will feel less alone in their views and will be more likely to ally with Republican Party in both large and small ways.

Young adults and teenagers face many problems within our society. But the Republican Party is well-equipped to take action and help this future generation. Youth are the future but, in order for that future to remain bright, they need to be connected with and encouraged.

Here is some information to bring those who missed the meeting up to speed on the

TPUSA movement. Patty works with high and middle schoolers specifically and hopes to start at least two or three more chapters in the Northern Nevada Area. These chapters are assembled at a high school so students at that one school can meet, hold events, and recruit only within or at that school. Students can also start a hub. Hubs are more effective for home-schooled students as this would not be associated with a specific school or student body but rather an activity students engage in after school. Hubs can still have meetings and hold events and be started with as few as three students.



Famous Women of Nevada Pr. Marzlene J. Adrian

We take this opportunity to honor Dr. Marlene J. Adrian, a fighter for women's equality who passed away on April 20, 2022. Marlene was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on September 3, 1933, where she first became acutely aware of the inequities between



boys and girls, which led her on the road to correct those disparities. She became an Associate Professor at Washington State University until 1983, at which time she moved on to join the faculty at the University of Illinois. She authored more than 100 research articles and nine books.

Her background was in Physical Education, Kinesiology, and Rehabilitation Education, and she became an expert in the art of fencing, such that she was a member of the US National Women's Epee Team. She was US National Sabre Champion, Silver Medalist in US National Women's Epee, and Gold Medalist on the US National Women's Epee Team.

She taught during the pre-Title IX times and was instrumental in correcting the inequality in sports; and co-founded Women of Diversity Productions, Inc. (WOD) in 1992 to give visibility to women, and create a woman-appreciated future.

She moved to Las Vegas in 1997, where she devoted herself to the mission of the WOD, making a large collection of audio-video documentaries for women, which is available at womenofdiversity.org. Two significant works include The Role of Women in Shaping the First 100 Years of Las Vegas (2005) and Nevada Women's Legacy – 150 Years of Excellence (2014 Nevada Sesquicentennial). There is much, "much more to say of Marlene, and I hope you look her up and maybe listen to one of her tapes.


